Santa Cruz man who died in police shootout identified

■ Authorities say Jose Avalos had a criminal record, but they do not know why he shot an officer

SANTA CRUZ — The man who shot a Santa Cruz police officer Thursday night and was then shot to death by police was a parolee with a history of violence. But investigators still do not know the reason for the shooting.

The dead man is Jose Avalos, described by authorities as a foreign national who lived in Santa Cruz. Court records say he was about 25 to 27.

Assistant District Attorney Gary Brayton said Avalos "was longtime gang member with extensive criminal history for violence." He was convicted twice for assaults with a deadly weapon and was twice turned

over to the Immigration and Naturalization Service after his release from prison, Brayton said. He was on parole for a 1998 assault charge at the time of the shooting.

The man he shot, five-year police veteran John Pursley, underwent surgery at Dominican Hospital in Santa Cruz. Despite his armored vest, the .45-caliber bullet apparently entered his side and exited through his back, puncturing a lung. He is expected to recover.

The district attorney's office takes over shooting investigations if officers are involved. But Brayton said Friday that details of the shootings were unclear, in part because he had not been able to interview Pursley.

The shootings took place in

8:15 p.m. "Routine night, routine radio traffic," said Haebe, who heads the investigations unit. "We didn't know they were there."

"Then all of a sudden an officer gets on the radio: 'Priority traffic. Shots fired. I'm hit in the back.'"

Brayton said the officers had stopped two men in the alley and were approaching them when a figure stirred in the front seat of a car he described as "practically abandoned," parked in a dirt area across the alley from the Leibrandt Apartments, just off Leibrandt Street.

What happened after that, is unclear. Pursley apparently approached the car, with Bayani behind him and to the left, in a covering position. Brayton said Avalos opened the driver-side door and fired first.

and Bayani fired in return. Autopsy reports expected to show how many hit Avalos. An examination of the car for shell casings and reveal how many were fired, Brayton said.
