

Berkeley stumbles against I

The end of the soccer season came a little too soon for teams in the Alameda Contra Costa Athletic League as the remaining participants in the North Coast Section playoffs were eliminated last Saturday.

The loss was especially tough on the No. 5 seeded boys from Berkeley High School in 3A action.

The team seemed poised to make a championship run after a 5-2 win over Arroyo in the opening round Feb. 19. But the Yellow Jackets finally met their match last Saturday against No. 4 De La Salle with a 2-1 defeat.

Unable to hold on to a 1-0 lead on Walker Toma's goal in the 13th minute, Berkeley was stung for two unanswered goals. But it was De La Salle's go-ahead goal on a direct kick in the 80th minute that created controversy.

The kick from the Spartans' Steven Wondolowski apparently went 35 yards through traffic and into the net. But Berkeley coach Janu Juarez argued that the kick

was an indirect kick and should not have counted because the ball went untouched by a Spartan player.

The referee waved it off but then awarded it by a brief conference with

"The season went great. It just ended on a bad note," Juarez said. "The referee decided everything. If we win, we would be playing the semifinal at Berkeley. But that's life."

On a more serious note, Berkeley junior forward Edgar Hernandez had to be taken to Kaiser Hospital in Oakland last Monday morning due to severe abdominal pains from hits he sustained during the match.

Speaking on the phone from his hospital bed last Monday night, Hernandez said he took a hard blow to his lower-left back in the first half but fought through the pain to stay in the game. Then in the second half, the situation was compounded after he took an elbow to the stomach.

NAVY INTENDS TO SIGN A FINDING OF SUITABILITY TO TRANSFER FOR SURPLUS PROPERTIES AT THE FORMER NAVAL FUEL DEPOT POINT MOLATE RICHMOND, CALIFORNIA

In accordance with Department of Defense guidance on reaching a Finding of Suitability to Transfer (FOST), notice is hereby given that the Department of the Navy intends to sign a FOST on or about April 4, 2003, in connection with the disposal of property at the former Naval Fuel Depot Point Molate by deed to nonfederal entities. This property is proposed for transfer to the City of Richmond.

The property subject to this FOST covers approximately 364 acres. The proposed reuse is consistent with Alternative 2, which is detailed in the Environmental Impact Statement/Environmental Impact Report (EIS/EIR), February 2002, developed by the City of Richmond and Southwest Division, Naval Facilities Engineering Command. Reuse includes commercial, light industrial, and recreational and open space.

The public is invited to review and comment on this proposed transfer beginning on February 21, 2003. The Navy will consider written comments received by March 24, 2003.
