FINAL HISTORICAL RADIOLOGICAL ASSESSMENT, NAVAL STATION TREASURE ISLAND, SAN FRANCISCO, CALIFORNIA.

Dear Mr. Anderson:

The Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC) staff completed its review of the Final Treasure Island Naval Station Historical Radiological Assessment (HRA), dated February 2005 and prepared by Weston Solutions, Inc. The primary purpose of the HRA is to designate sites as impacted or non-impacted. To designate sites as impacted or non-impacted, the HRA defines the extent of past radiological operations, assesses the likelihood of potential contamination and potential contamination migration pathways, and recommends future actions.

The HRA assessed 542 historical and current sites (e.g., buildings, structures and open areas) at NSTI of which eighteen sites were identified as requiring further review. Of those 18 sites, 13 were ultimately designated as non-impacted and are discussed further in the HRA to document the non-impacted designation. Five sites are designated as impacted and are recommended for further investigative actions. They include Buildings 233, 343 and 343 and four solid waste disposal areas located within Site 12.

Based on our review, DTSC concurs with the Navy's identification of the five impacted locations and its recommendation to further investigate each of the areas.
