Where do the SEABEES fall in with the rest of the Navy?



Navy Expeditionary Combat Command (NECC) Mission:

Organize, man, train, equip and sustain Navy Expeditionary Combat Forces to execute combat, combat support, and combat service support missions across the full spectrum of naval, joint and combined operations which enable access from the sea and freedom of action throughout the sea-to-shore and inland operating environments. The NECC Commander provides expeditionary forces to support the



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missions of the Pacific and Atlantic Fleets. Subordinate to the NECC Commander is the Maritime Expeditionary Security Force, Explosive Ordnance Disposal Force, Navy Expeditionary Logistics Support Group, Expeditionary Intelligence, Expeditionary Combat Readiness Center, Expeditionary Warfighting Development Center, Expeditionary Combat Camera, and last but not least, the Naval Construction Force, also called the Navy Seabees.

Naval Construction Force (NCF) Mission:



Naval Construction Force (Seabees) provides a wide range of construction support for operating forces, including building roads, bridges, bunkers, airfields, waterfront structures, and logistics bases. They also provide support for disaster recovery operations, perform civic action projects to improve relations with other nations and provide anti-terrorism/force protection for personnel and construction projects.

The Navy Seabees are primarily headquartered in Port Hueneme, California and in Gulfport, Mississippi. “We Build, We Fight” is our motto.



Naval Construction Group ONE (NCG 1) and Naval Construction Group TWO (NCG 2) organize, man, train, maintain, and equip Seabee forces for the Pacific Fleet and Atlantic Fleet, respectively. Both NCGs are subordinate to the Navy Expeditionary Combat Command. Seabee forces at all echelons provide the required engineering support our Navy and Marine Corps needs to construct and maintain base facilities, to repair battle damaged facilities, to conduct defensive operations as required, and to meet disaster preparedness and recovery missions.
