difference from the back and then moving forward."

Wheeler's Lily Foulkes scored her fourth and final goal with 16:11 left in the game to knot the score at 8-8. Four minutes later, an unmarked Maya Sullivan gathered a beautiful arching pass from Veta Mayer over the Middletown defense directly in front of the Islanders goal.

Sullivan cleanly beat Middletown freshman goalie Joanna Steinhauer from in close for a goal that put the Warriors ahead for good.

"The first half the defense was awesome," Middletown coach Bill Waterman said. "I don't know if we got gassed a little bit or what, but we weren't getting back quick enough. That left our three main defenders down low by themselves. I think if they got front and back a little quicker, it would have made a big difference."

When Middletown worked the ball around on offense during the second half, it was stymied by Wheeler goalie Lily Clayton. She finished with 10 saves, and half of them were off of unguarded eight-meter shots following Wheeler fouls.

"She had an outstanding game," Bissett said. "She's struggled a little bit the past couple games, so it was nice to see her get her confidence back and kind of save us for a while there. She started to recognize

patterns, which we've been working on. She really came through today so I'm happy with it."

Hannah Bellagamba had three first-half goals, the final one coming with 14 seconds before intermission, to give Middletown a 7-6 lead.

The Islanders trailed 4-1 early, but Bellagamba, Sunny Kennedy and Amanda Jones scored three goals in two minutes to make it 4-4. Foulkes and Middletown's Laura Smolenski traded goals, then Mayer and

Wauters did likewise to make it 6-6.

"We could tell that (the Warriors) were frustrated," Bertsch said. "We overcame some obstacles we were facing with our offense and our defense and we worked out some kinks."

But after Wauters scored to open the second half, it was the Islanders who were frustrated. Middletown held a 15-11 edge in shots over Wheeler in the opening half, but the Warriors had a 12-6 advantage the second half.

Steinhauer, who made 11 saves, was up to the challenge for the most part. She stopped three eight-meter shots and a couple of other tries from in close.

"Our goalie, for a freshman, does a phenomenal job," Waterman said. "She's been great. (Wheeler's) goalie did a great job, too. She's got real good moves and moves her feet really well."

Middletown slipped to 5-4 in Division II, while Wheeler remained atop the league standings with a 7-0 record. However, there definitely was a silver lining to the loss for Middletown.

"I think we really improved this game," Bertsch said. "I think we'll look at it in a more positive way than a negative way. We'll take it to our next game and hopefully the play-offs."

Notes: The referees ruled Middletown goalie Joanna Steinhauer's stick to be illegal just prior to the start of the game. The rules state the stick can be no longer than 52 inches long, and Steinhauer's stick, which she has used in every game she's played in, was measured at 56 inches. A teammate drove Steinhauer to get another stick and she returned about 20 minutes later with four goalie sticks. The first one measured was too long, but the next one was legal so she used it in the game. ... The contest, originally set to start at 5 p.m., started 25 minutes late.

when there will likely be more intrigue than usual.

Missouri linebacker Michael Sam, who made public that he is gay in February, is projected to be a possible late-round selection. The NFL has never had an openly gay player. Sam is trying to be the first, though he might have to get there as an undrafted free agent.

But first, the Texans are on the clock. Will they take Clowney?

"Man, I don't know," the 266-pound pass rusher said. "Do you know?"

Clowney looked NFL-ready after a spectacular sophomore season, when he had 13 sacks and was chosen as the Southeastern Conference Defensive Player of the Year.

Clowney's junior season fell short of crazy expectations. He had some injuries. Opponents game-planned to neutralize him. His play was spotty and his work ethic was questioned after he suddenly went to his coach and pulled himself from a game.

"It's been crazy, everybody telling when you're going to go in the draft," he said. "What your weakness is. What your strength is. A lot of criticism against all the players. It's just something you got to take on."

Clowney took it on at the combine and his pro day workout at South Carolina. He wowed scouts with the speed and agility of a running back and placed himself firmly at the top of just about every mock draft.

Still, it's not a foregone conclusion the Texans will take him.

Houston needs a quarterback and new coach Bill O'Brien has said he plans to add one during this draft. Many fans in southeast Texas would like it to be Manziel, the 2012 Heisman Trophy winner and native Texan who played for Texas A&M.

If there is one player who can relate to the scrutiny Clowney

has faced, it's Johnny Football.

Manziel's character has been questioned after having a brush with the law and another with the NCAA during his time at Texas A&M. And he's had his heavy-on-improvisation style dissected by scouts. He's also a little short by NFL quarterback standards, just under 6-feet. Still, his play was so sensational he could end up as a top-five pick.

"I don't care if I'm No. 1 or 200, I just want to play," Manziel said.

It is doubtful Manziel will have to wait that long. He could be the first quarterback off the board.

Or maybe that'll be Central Florida's Blake Bortles. He looks the part of the classic NFL quarterback at 6-foot-5, 232 pounds. He's nimble, too, but also a late-bloomer.

Then there's Louisville quarterback Teddy Bridgewater, who many figured would challenge to be the No. 1 overall pick. He apparently slipped out of favor during the postseason draft process. Small hands, a narrow frame and an underwhelming pro day combined to make Bridgewater no sure thing to be taken in the first round. At least that's what the so-called experts say. But who knows how seriously to take that?

"You try not to pay attention to what's being said, but at the end of the day, I'm human," Bridgewater said.

Tonight, the speculation ends. "I'm just ready, man," Clowney said, speaking for just about everybody.

Lars Eller ended the rally with a final-minute empty-net goal.

"This is such a huge rivalry," Weise said. "When they meet in the regular season it's looked at like a playoff matchup. It's such a cool thing to be a part of."

The Bruins acknowledge they did not have their best game, starting with goalie Tuukka Rask, who allowed three goals on 25 shots on Tuesday and has yielded 10 goals in the three games.

Perhaps for the first time in the playoffs, they missed injured defense veterans Dennis Seidenberg and Adam McQuaid, as youngster Dougie Hamilton, in particular, struggled at times.

McQuaid is gone for the season, and while Seidenberg is skating, there was no word on when he may return. But the Bruins can never be counted out, as they've shown repeatedly in recent seasons.

"We're a group that's confident, but we have guys now that are frustrated," Boston coach Claude Julien said. "They know they have to be better and they will be better."

"It's a 2-1 series. It's not the end of the world here. We've just got to battle back. There's no reason to panic."

The Canadiens had surprises for Boston, including a tweak of the top two lines that saw Thomas Vanek put on the second unit with Tomas Plekanec and Michael Bournival while Brendan Gallagher moved up with David Desharnais and Max Pacioretty.

Montreal also got a strong 26-save outing from goalie Carey Price and a third straight two-point game from defenseman P.K. Subban, who has 11 points in the past six playoff games.
